PASTOR'S MESSAGE

*“Nurturing, teaching and mentoring our children is **MISSION CRITICAL!**”*

There is much to be excited about around St. Michael's these days. Our new Ministry Initiatives are beginning to take shape, and some are already up and running, while others are ready to launch in the next month. Some others are, by nature, longer range, but the work has begun in earnest on each one of the eleven that we have envisioned and adopted. The enthusiasm and support for these new ministries from all of you is inspiring, encouraging, and commendable.

There is one area of our ministry, however, that is in desperate need of just that kind of support and participation from St. Michael's people.

We currently have 18 children enrolled in our Sunday School, and another 15 in cradle roll and nursery who be added to the Sunday School number in the next few years! This past Sunday we baptized three children, and on Sunday, June 9th six of our young people will be confirmed, and will affirm for themselves the vows and commitments that were made on their behalf by their parents back when they were baptized. All of this is cause for great celebration!

But it is also the basis for my concern, and the occasion to remember that we all share in the responsibility of nurturing faith in these children in any and every way that we can, and helping them to grow in their discipleship as people of Christ.

NURTURING, TEACHING AND MENTORING OUR CHILDREN IS MISSION-CRITICAL!


There are two specific ways that we need to step up.

We currently have but two people committed to the teaching and mentoring of our children in Sunday School come fall. Laura King and Jan Kunkle are two of the most important people in our midst when it comes to the care and nurturing of our children. They are dedicated and committed, and the love that they have for the children is evident. **WE DO NOT WANT TO LEAVE THIS MISSION-CRITICAL MINISTRY to them alone!** Burnout is a real concern, and we owe it to these two leaders, and to all of the children in our care, to support them in their ministry.

The simple reason why we currently schedule Sunday School during worship is that experience has taught us that many families are unwilling or unable to commit to more than one hour on Sunday mornings. This is the reality in which we are called to minister. One of my primary concerns is that our single hour schedule means that the very people who are charged with nurturing our children are not themselves able to be nurtured in worship! They make this

sacrifice willingly, out of love for the children, but it should not be so! WE NEED MORE PEOPLE TO INVEST THEMSELVES AND THEIR TIME TEACHING OR ASSISTING WITH SUNDAY SCHOOL! If we had enough committed volunteers, we could set up a rotation schedule that would enable ALL Sunday School staff to be in worship on a regular basis.

We have spent considerable time in Confirmation Class emphasizing the nature of the vows and commitments made when our young people affirm their baptism. Each student is asked to prayerfully and thoughtfully consider whether they are ready to make these commitments, and we specifically discuss the expectation that they will continue to be active in the life of the church, and to strive to grow in faith. And all 6 of those completing their confirmation studies have responded "YES!"

Now it is OUR responsibility to them to provide them with an age-appropriate setting for them in which we can continue to nurture, teach, and encourage them. WE CURRENTLY HAVE NO SUCH SETTING.

I will be sitting down soon with a few key leaders to discuss what an ongoing ministry with our post-confirmation young people might look like. We must establish a specific ministry geared to meeting their needs. THIS, TOO, IS MISSION-CRITICAL!

Finally, both of these MISSION-CRITICAL MINISTRIES need to take shape by the coming fall.

Please spend some time in thought and prayer over these critical ministries. If you are willing to invest of yourself so that we might meet these critical needs, please contact either Laura King, Jan Kunkle, or me.

We do not yet know what form these ministries will take. We will decide together, based on congregational response, and the gifts and skills of those who will give of themselves for the sake of our children.

Home Maintenance Initiative

The home maintenance group provides minor household repairs and services to those in the Camillus area who cannot physically or financially accommodate the repairs themselves. We have responded to eight calls in the last month from people in need of help. These clients are all from the Camillus/Marcellus/Fairmont areas that have heard of St. Michael's services from the Camillus Senior Center postings or their news letter or from flyers placed in Meals on Wheels distributions. Services have ranged from replacing a light bulb to repairing a broken gutter. We have painted, assembled, tightened, installed, and repaired many items in their homes all at no cost to the client. Most clients have multiple issues that need addressing.

Thrivent has provided funds that are used to replace non-repairable items or install new items (smoke detectors).

I would like to thank our talented group for their efforts in this community service; Greg Allen, Rod Bauer, and Dick Wood. I invite any others that are interested in participating in this rewarding activity to give me a call. It costs you nothing!!

Sunday Forum


Our last meeting of Sunday Forum was May 19. We will resume again in September (either same day as Sunday School or the following Sunday. We will discuss it with the group.

What would entice you to come? Specific topics? Guest speakers? Childcare? Different day/time? we are open to any and all suggestions.....



Highlights of my Central Crossroads Adult Mission Trip:

1. It was a delight to work with all 18 participants. All were committed to this mission and all came ready willing and able to work. There were jobs for all levels of physical ability. No matter what level you worked at - we all were ready for our beds each night.
2. Fellowship is always an important part of working together. I enjoyed meeting new friends in faith and hope to work together again.
3. Mar Lu Ridge Camp is beautiful and well run. Facilities are well maintained and attractive. The chapel is an inspirational space, with a magnificent view.
4. The Lutheran World Relief Warehouse is a true example of faith at work. It is a large facility managed by 3 full-time and 3 part-time employees. All the Ingatherings at our church really do count and end up in places of need. We packed goods from churches from all across this country.
5. Martha's Table is an impressive non-profit organization, feeding and educating the needy in Washington, DC. All within site of the Washington Monument. It is well organized, well funded and has been doing its work for 30+ years. It was a joy to work at the market, held at a charter school, assembling and handing out bags of food to all participants at that school.
6. During the "at camp" day, I worked at assembling trail mix bags, and toiletry bags, that were distributed the next day at the Shepherd's Table ministry. I also ended up doing some filing in the office. This unexpected task gave me insight to the programs and participants of the camp.
7. Being on a trip, in a very historic part of the country, with Tom Henry was a bonus. Having an expert guide us through the Antietam Battlefield, gave us insight to the significance of this horrific battle.



Mission Trip Reports

Mission Work at Its Best

The Central Crossroads Adult Mission volunteers over three days accomplished some significant goals. This year the goals included aiding Lutheran World Relief by breaking down donations of quilts, school kits and personal care kits. Then repackaging them for shipment to disaster areas. Another goal was to aid the Mar-Lu-Ridge camp staff in cleaning up the grounds including building a new storage shed and demolishing a couple of old arks (sleeping areas). Lastly, we helped Martha's Table by setting up a joyful Food Market at an elementary school in Washington, D.C. providing free food to anyone at the school. A second group fed people at the Shepherd's Table at Grace Lutheran Church in Westminster, MD.

When I reflect on the various activities that we did, I found special meaning in the work we did at the LWR Warehouse in New Windsor, MD. In this massive warehouse we found three full-time workers who are most reliant on the volunteers who come in every day to process the shipments of donated items that come in all the time from numerous Lutheran congregations from all over the United States. This is a massive number of boxes – skids upon skids of mixed items. In an assembly line organization with a minimum amount of training we were quickly up and running. At the end of the day as we reflected on the amazing number of boxes that we were able to put together and then store in the warehouse for LWR's response to any disaster, one is humbled by the impact that the efforts of a few volunteers can have on the lives of people who are suffering from a disaster and in dire need of help. It gives one a sense of the satisfaction in what our hands can achieve in the fulfillment of God's work.

Mission Trip Report

Volunteering –

Many years ago I was encouraged to include volunteering as a component of life. Some benefits, that were given were supported by reasonable data, were logical to accept – helps you develop new skills, builds your experience and supports you to have a healthier body. Two benefits were surprising – makes you feel like you have “more time” and your love makes you feel “more love”.

Through the various volunteer experiences where I have participated, I found that leadership makes the difference. The work completed by volunteers hinges on the attitude that the leader brought to the task and the commitment that they were willing to make to see volunteers succeed in accomplishing whatever it was they have volunteered to accomplish. Empowering, collaborating and a culture of gratitude were as important for volunteer success as it was to have fun.

25% of people living in the US volunteer. I plan to continue to be part of this group and would encourage everyone to seek out volunteer experiences. Why? Two projects that I really appreciated on this trip come to mind.

- At LWR Warehouse, packing supplies (personal care kits, infant care kits, school kits) for the disaster that will inevitably happen. They are ready to respond - now.
- At Martha's Table preparing and serving a salad – apples, kale, carrots, raisins with a basic dressing and serving grade school children to taste a sample as their parent received a grocery bag with a carton of milk, a carrot of great size, a green pepper, onions, white potatoes, kale, parsley, apples, and cold cereal. Recipes on preparing these foods were available. Giving real food to help feed a family with a minimal income.

Yes – I feel like I have “more time” and I truly feel “more love”.

When I reflect on the recent Central Crossroads Adult Mission Trip to Maryland, the leadership skills from the organizers, Bonnie McCabe and Tom Henry, to the persons at each work location definitely provided the attitude and commitment that made the event a successful volunteer experience. Five days together allowed me to get to know 17 very interesting people as together we traveled by car, ate our meals, addressed the work projects, enjoyed the camp set on a ridge, gained knowledge of the Civil War as we walked parts of the Antietam battlefield, and worshiped Our Lord in a chapel designed with an abundance of windows to see the outdoors.






